From the Incumbent's Desk

In the second week of May, clergy and lay delegates from every parish in our widespread diocese came together in Sault Ste Marie for our 49th Synod. We gathered to learn together, to worship together, and – of course – to do the business of the Church together. As Anglicans, we say that our church is "episcopally led and synodically governed". The word "Episcopal" comes from the Greek word "Episkopos" which literally means "overseer" (epi = over; skopos = watchman). The word "synod" comes from the Greek word "synodos" which means "assembly" or "meeting". In a nutshell, this means that bishops have oversight and make many decisions as they carry on the role originally undertaken by the apostles – the bishops are responsible for the unity, discipline, and orthodoxy of



members under their charge. This doesn't mean that bishops make *all* of the decisions. In the Anglican Church, no single person holds the power to make decisions on behalf of the wider church – not even the Archbishop of Canterbury. This is where the "synods" come in. The Bishop, clergy, and lay delegates gather every couple of years in Diocesan Synod to make decisions together concerning the ongoing life of the diocese. This model holds true at the parish level too. The incumbent (the bishop's representative) makes certain types of decisions but representatives of the parish gather in synod (the parish council) to make other decisions together. Anglicans often engage in a lot of dialogue before coming to any sort of consensus – and sometimes a consensus is never reached. Some people find this method frustrating and think, perhaps, it would be simpler if our church had a "do this/don't do that" way of operating like other denominations do. However, it is one of the beauties of Anglicanism that we are able to embrace our diversity as a strength. Millions of Anglicans around the world are held together by bonds of love – not because we are all the same and certainly not because we all agree on everything. I was so very proud of the Anglican Church as represented by the people of Algoma in our Diocesan Synod – we spent time in dialogue over the controversial issue of same-sex marriage and, in a



roomful of 200 people, there was not even one raised voice. The large room was filled with the quiet hum of people sharing their thoughts while the other people at their table compassionately and respectfully listened. There is a wide range of opinions on this issue but what became clear rather quickly was that people are committed to being the Anglican Church in Algoma together – differences and all. In *Paul's Letter to the Ephesians*, we are called "to lead a life worthy of the calling to which you have been called, with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one

another in love, making every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope of your calling, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is above all and through all and in all." (Eph.4:1-6)


